Based on the current tuition rate of \$51 per credit hour, the average full-time student at MCC pays \$2,500 a year for tuition, books, and fees.

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President Bush visits MCC

Mesa Community College was honored to host the President of the United States, George W. Bush, at the college's Southern and Dobson campus on Wednesday, Jan. 21. Approximately 250 guests enjoyed a close-up view of the President in the Theatre Outback, while additional faculty, staff, and students watched on a direct electronic feed.

A panel of seven, including President Bush, participated in a discussion entitled "Jobs

for the 21st Century." Other panel members included:

- Dr. Larry K. Christiansen, MCC President
- Dr. Mary Vanis, Director of the Center for Workforce Development for the Maricopa Community Colleges
- Martin Bean, chair of Public Policy for CompTIA (Computing Technology Industry Association), and
- MCC students Stacey Leedhom, Robert Chapman, and Bill Moses

Each of the students related personal life stories about how their education at MCC has created new opportunities for them in the workforce after layoffs and career changes.

President Bush began, "Last night in my speech (State of the Union) I talked about spending additional money to focus directly on collaborative programs at the community college level that takes the input from business, takes the desire of workers, and matches them so people can find



good work. Congress needs to pass \$250 million in job training money that goes specifically to community colleges to fund the kind of programs we're going to talk about here today."

Among the programs and systems discussed were MCC's Business and Industry Institute, campus Career Centers, and NITAS (National IT Apprenticeship System). President Bush also touched briefly on his plan for a Temporary Worker program for people coming

from Mexico to work in the United States.

MCC was selected for Bush's post- State of the

Union address largely because of its collaboration with the technology industry through MCC's Business and Industry continued on in:

Janet Napolitano. It was an honor and a privilege to host both distinguished leaders.

During his visit, President Bush recognized the MCC Business & Industry Institute's information technology program as a "model program in workforce training" and called MCC a "great" college.

At MCC, excellence spans the breadth and depth all of our programs. As an alum, you know this firsthand.

Today, MCC is facing an enormous challenge. By 2020, studies show that student enrollment will double, reaching 50,000-60,000 students. This will happen when our children, grandchildren, and neighborhood children are ready for college. That time is not so far away.

Last year we completed a two-phase 20-year master plan. Phase one calls for four new buildings on the Southern and Dobson campus, refurbishing some of our 30 plus-year old facilities, increasing our technology capabilities, adding necessary parking spaces, and continually upgrading campus security. At our Red Mountain campus, we need to add three new buildings with more classrooms and laboratories. MCC is also engaged in discussions and early planning with the City of Mesa to create a MCC Downtown Campus.

MCC's ability to meet the growing educational demands of our community will not happen without new capital funding, which is why the Maricopa Community College District is planning for a bond election in November 2004. Institute and Network Academy. Dr. Pinny Sheoran, Director of the Business and Industry Institute, and numerous other MCC faculty sit on national boards that help to increase MCC's visibility beyond Maricopa County and the State of Arizona. The sheer size of MCC also helps to bring national attention. With an enrollment of more than 27,000 students each semester, MCC is one of the largest community colleges in the nation.

The college is thrilled that the President's visit was for all the right reasons - to recognize MCC academic programs and students. MCC alumnus Ron Rangel was impressed with Bush's demeanor and interaction with the students. "He was very personable with the students - it wasn't about our deans and college president - it was about the students. I was proud for my school." MCC's director of Technology Support Services, Bill DeHaan echoed Ron's sentiments, stating "It was powerful to be in such an intimate setting with the President of the United States, where he encouraged the students to visit candidly about their lives and their futures."

President Bush expressed his confidence in the community college system. "I think the community college system in our country is one of our great strengths," he said. "As this economy changes, there is opportunity. You just have to seize it!"

Presidential visit translates to teachable moments

Faculty capitalized on a number of teachable moments that grew out of President Bush's visit to MCC. Journalists from MCC's student newspaper, The Legend, had the opportunity to observe the event firsthand and visit with members of the national media and White House staff. Picket lines of Bush's supporters and opponents provided rich fodder for classroom discussions, with topics ranging from political and social issues to the ability of U.S. citizens to exercise their first amendment rights of free speech.

neuroscientific liaison for Ortho-McNeil Pharmaceutical, an operating company for Johnson & Johnson. "I develop relationships and start research projects," Michael

said. "I serve as a fieldbased medical information expert, educating physicians about company products." Michael is also a faculty member at Loma-Linda University School of Medicine, where he is involved in research and has taught neuroscience classes.

Michael started on the path to a neuroscience career when he enrolled at MCC in 1989. "When I originally started, I didn't even know I wanted to go into psychology," he said. "I thought psychology was a joke." Michael's first experience in Psychology 101 turned out to be a disappointment. He earned only a C and wanted an A, so he took

the class again – this time with Dr. Ann Ewing. "Ann got me excited about psychology," Michael said. "I didn't see it as a soft science any more."

Michael studied neurosciences at the University of Arizona. Postdoctoral work and internship/residency requirements broadened his experiences even further. Michael is considered an expert in estimating pre-

morbid abilities and is often invited to present nationally on various topics, such as migraine headaches.

"I feel that MCC is where it all began," Michael said. "MCC was a wonderful launching block for me, and the faculty within the Psychology Deptartment are phenomenal. I think I was one of the first of Ann's students to go on and get a doctorate."

Arlen Sykes teaches fifth grade at Kyrene de la Colina. Prior to earning his master's degree in Education, he attended Mesa Community College (1996-98). He developed the Psi Beta Alumni Chapter for MCC and recently received the Outstanding Alumni Chapter Service Award for his effort. Psi Beta is a national honor society for students in Psychology.

Arlen continues to work with Psi Beta in support of Special Olympics. He organizes volunteers, blending middle school students with Psi Beta college students, hoping to excite the younger students about attending college. "These kids get a focus," Arlen said. "They see normal everyday people going to college and begin to believe that it might be possible for them, too."
